#### INTRODUCTION

The records that make up NUWGA 2 were donated by Professor Eva Philbin and other members in March 1984, as the second deposit by the National University Women Graduates' Association.

NUWGA was formed from what was originally known as the Irish Association of Women Graduates and Candidate Graduates [IAWG&CG], with Hanna Sheehy Skeffington, Dr Mulvany and Mary Hayden as stalwarts of the Association in the early days. The Association was formed by women graduates who were initially seeking to improve the rights of women in education. The IAWG&CG was affiliated to the International Federation of University Women [IntFUW], later becoming a branch association of the Irish Federation of University Women, [IrFUW, see NUWGA 2/9]. In the transition from IAWG&CG, NUWGA was often referred to as the National University of Ireland Women Graduates' Association, the 'I' later being dropped.

As its name suggests NUWGA was composed of members from the three universities of the NUI: University College Cork, UCC, University College Dublin, UCD, and University College Galway, UCG. Members could join for life or annually [seeNUWGA 2/38]. All the records relate to the UCD branch of NUWGA, sometimes referred to as the Dublin branch; and they kept close contact with Cork and with Galway, in particular communication between Professor Carmel Humphries and Rita Larkin. [see NUWGA 2/43]. Links were also kept with the Queen's University Belfast WGA, Dublin University WGA a.k.a. Trinity College Dublin WGA. All these associations and the NUWGA formed the IrFUW, who were in turn part of the IntFUW.

NUWGA's interests were primarily in education. Much was done between 1905 and 1920 to see that the Register of Teachers was not abolished, and that teachers were given fair and adequate training. Efforts were also made to ensure that the medical and legal professions gave equal rights to women and that professional women were given an equal opportunity to men in employment.

The Association was also involved in Convocation, the dealings of Seanad Eirenn, keeping a close eye on proceedings relevant to their membership. They were also quick to tackle the Senate of the NUI on such matters as the inclusion of a child care aspect to a social welfare course being introduced.

In the post war years, especially, they took a great interest in such organisations as the Red Cross and the International Refugee Organisation, forming a fund for women students in Munster, Germany, to provide them with warm clothing and blankets. Other charitable acts included the acquisition of a library for the British FUW's premises, Crosby Hall, London.

#### I. General administration

#### a. Minute books

1 20 March 1903 - 28 January 1914

Minute book of the Irish Association of Women Graduates recording meetings held on an irregular basis, every 2-3

months or as required. Details are recorded of members present, proposals made, forthcoming activities and their arrangements, and resolutions and memorials sent on behalf of the Association. Proposals may concern an issue such as the establishment of the literary and debating section within the Association or that press releases or reports be made of their activities. Resolutions passed may tackle topics like 'they [the IAWG&CG] trust that the teaching of the Fellows of the Royal University of Ireland at University College will be alike to the women as to the men, thus ensuring the full benefits of a University education' (16 June 1905). Memorials concern educational matters such as one sent to Heads of Department regarding the employment of Temporary Clerks 'asking them if they would be good enough to notify vacancies in the temporary staff when they occur with a view to receiving applications for them from women graduates' (15 May 1903). Their activities in pursuing the rights of women, particularly in second and third level education are recorded in the minutes, such as their request to UCD to appoint a university graduate as Lady Dean in he interests of women (5 May 1913). Later entries express concern over the fate of the Association 'The President (Dr Mulvany) was of the opinion that the work for which the Association was formed had been completed and the raison d'être of the society being gone it would be better that it should cease to exist' (4 March 1913). Meetings held at Alexandra School or 33 Leeson Street. Minutes are signed by the current President or another committee member. Enclosures: motion of sympathy to the parents of Miss May Curran, Hon. Treas. of the IAWG&CG, since its formation, on her death (6 Dec 1905); three press cuttings of IAWG&CG meetings (1905).

2 10 December 1913 - 5 June 1917

Minute book of the Irish Association of Women Graduates, recording the proceedings of committee meetings,

mostly held at Alexandra School and 52 St Stephen's Green, on almost every second month. Matters include appointments to the committee; resignations; proposals; details of memorials and resolutions passed and Association activities. Of particular concern is the encouragement of women members of the National University of Ireland to become members of convocation, in an endeavour to obtain a female member of the Senate, for which there were memorials (19 June 1914). A resolution that the Association become affiliated with the Dublin branch of the National Union of Women Workers. Resolution passed urging MPs to support Viscount Wolmer's Bill for the admission of women to both branches of the legal profession (19 June 1914). Appointment of women to the Board of Intermediate Studies and medical women to staffs of general hospitals (29 Sept 1914). Enclosures: agenda of committee meeting (17 Nov 1916); newspaper cutting on NUWGA committee meeting outlining the resolution passed expressing satisfaction with the commission on the civil service.

Queen's College, Cork, concerning their previous correspondence on the possibility of having training for teachers established in the College; referring to the interest in the project shown by Dr Windle, College President; and making a number of specific suggestions to enable them to make progress on the matter.

# B. NATIONAL UNIVERSITY WOMEN GRADUATES' ASSOCIATION, 1916-c1970

#### I. General administration

#### a. Minute books

21 5 March 1935 - 1 November 1957

Minute book recording proceedings of committee and general meetings, annual general meetings, annual

dinners and colloquia of the Dublin Branch of NUWGA. General meetings usually consist of addresses by guest speakers on cultural and educational matters. Committee meetings include discussion of rules and regulations; actions to be taken such as protests against advertising jobs for men only; the decision to open 'a fund for the relief of Distressed Intellectuals in Europe' (14 June 1945); and official opposition to Articles 40, 41 and 45 of the Draft Constitution, resulting in the sending of a delegation to the Dáil requesting their amendment or deletion (May 1937). Earlier minutes give a summary of content of speeches given by speakers; from 1940-41 the minutes become very terse. Committee minutes are recorded separately after May 1953 [NUWGA2/22]. Includes news cuttings of reports of Association activities.

Minute book of committee meetings of NUWGA, Dublin Branch, detailing proceedings of the meetings;

committee members and changes in the committee; and topics discussed for further action. Topics include: the alteration of a statute by convocation (30 June 1953); the drawing up of a constitution for NUWGA (16 October 1953); the acquisition of a headquarters in Dublin (25 January 1953); a proposed symposium on 'Social Service Activities in Dublin' (13 , October 1954); NUWGA's application for a grant from the Senate of the NUI (28 February 1955); the introduction of a course in Child Welfare to UCD's Diploma in Social Science (20 June 1955); the advertising of posts limited to men (20 June 1955); the sacking of almoners from Meath Hospital (26 November 1956); and women on juries (17 April 1959). Minutes deal with less substantial matters in later years.

Also invitations to the association to take part in discussions such as a proposal for a survey of employment in Dublin and Central Borough from Donal O'Kelly (21 January 1949); and letters relating to IrFUW matters.

Münster Student Hostel Fund correspondence and notes relating to the appeal for and collection of clothing

and blankets for women students at the University of Münster, Germany. Amongst the letters are the copy of an extract from Mrs Elinor Burley's original appeal on behalf of the women at the University of Münster, covering letters from subscribers to the fund, correspondence between Mary J. Hogan, secretary NUWGA and the Irish Red Cross Society concerning the export of the collected items to Germany, and between Mary J. Hogan and the British Army Education Branch, based in Münster, concerning the delivery of the collection. Also contains letters of thanks in English and German from the students in receipt of the clothing and blankets at Schloss Buldern and their warden Baroness Stoeff, Studentinnenheim, 21a Buldern I.W. über Dülmen. One student, Herta Sphethoff, student of theology and philosophy at University of Münster, talks of the anticipation of and arrival of the 'Irish clothes' and also of life at the hostel.
