# Why study Linguistics?

#### WHAT IS LINGUISTICS?

Linguistics is the scientific study of language. It involves exploring major questions such as:

What are the building blocks of language? How are these building blocks arranged? How do languages vary? How do children acquire language? Why do only humans acquire language? What is language used for? How does language intersect with social identities? How do languages change over time?

#### WHAT WILL I LEARN?

The first year modules in Linguistics are designed to lead to an understanding of the main areas in Linguistics and are designed to allow students to start dealing with the key issues in Linguistics from the start.

- LING 10020 Language Acquisition and Disruption
- LING 10030 Sounds in Language
- LING 10040 Words and Sentences

The modules in the second and final years build on these modules to deepen your understanding of the nature of Language.

The study of Linguistics opens up a broad range of career options due to the fact that language is involved in so many facets of life and work. The training that Linguistics provides can form the basis of a career in language teaching. It can also lead to a career in publishing. The link with Clinical Sciences leads to careers in Speech and Language therapy. The link with Computer Science and Cognitive Science can lead to careers in information technology, natural language processing, grammar checkers and so on. There are also Masters and PhD programmes in Linguistics which you can enroll in after you complete your BA.
