Introduction

Welcome to the UCD College of Social Sciences and Law. Situated at the heart of University College Dublin's Belfield campus, the College is home to over 6,000 students and is the largest and most comprehensive in Ireland for study and research across Social Sciences and Law.

The College is a leading centre for education and research in Ireland delivering a comprehensive range of internationally recognised, academically rigorous graduate degrees across Social Science and Law disciplines. The College has eleven academic Schools and a number of associated Research Centres, which encompass the widest range of Social Sciences and Law disciplines with over 2,500 students on our graduate programmes.

Graduate degrees, including taught masters, research masters, doctorates and professional doctorates, are offered in the Schools of Archaeology, Economics, Education, Geography, Information & Communication Studies, Law, Philosophy, Politics and International Relations, Psychology, Sociology and Social Justice, Social Policy and Social Work. Globally the College is ranked very highly in Social Sciences and Law disciplines, with all disciplines represented within the top 200 in the QS WUR Subject Rankings (2023) including a top 50 position for Library and Information Management top 100 rankings for Archaeology, Philosophy, Law and Politics and International Studies. Interdisciplinary and multidisciplinary degrees are available on topics such as Behavioural Economics, Cognitive Science, Sustainable Development, Public Policy, Digital Policy, Geopolitics and Human Rights. Additionally, the College offers a range of professional diplomas and certificate programmes.

The College employs engaging and interactive methods of teaching and learning in a collaborative and supportive environment. Selected masters degrees offer students the opportunity to liaise directly with partner organisations through project work or undertake professional internships in Ireland or internationally. The College attracts students from all over the world including North and South America, Asia, Africa and throughout the EU. Our highly globalised faculty includes academics from all over the world, including Asia, Latin America, North America, Africa and Europe.

Our world-leading academics have received prestigious awards and accolades for their research, and the College has received funding and research grants from the the EU's Research Framework Programmes, major national funding agencies such as Science Foundation Ireland and the Irish Research Council (IRC) and a wide range of national and international foundation, governmental and industry partners.

Why UCD?

Ireland's Global University

The international standing of UCD has grown in recent years; it is currently ranked within the top 1% of higher education institutions world-wide. UCD is also Ireland's most globally engaged university with over 38,000 students drawn from 144 countries, including over 5,000 students based at locations outside of Ireland. The University's main Dublin campus occupies an extensive parkland estate of 133 hectares and offers world-leading facilities including the UCD O'Brien Centre for Science, UCD Sutherland School of Law, UCD Lochlann Quinn School of Business, UCD Moore Centre for Business, and the UCD Student Centre.

As Ireland's largest university, with its great strength and diversity of disciplines, UCD embraces its role to contribute to the flourishing of Ireland and the world; through the study and discussion of people, society, business, economy, culture, languages and the creative arts, as well as through research and innovation.

Tackling global challenges: Research & Innovation at UCD

Research and innovation are essential drivers of a dynamic economy, an informed society and a vibrant culture. The spectrum of research and innovation at UCD encompasses individual scholars, small, medium and large research groups, start-up companies and large-scale collaborations with industry and other partners. Research is conducted within each of the University's extensive range of disciplines, and in multidisciplinary research programmes addressing challenges of a global scale.

In 2021/22 UCD researchers secured €156 million in research grants from national and international funding agencies, companies and foundations. Since 2012/13 UCD researchers have secured over €1.3 billion in such grants. Their research underpins national research and technology institutes and centres, including the SFI funded Insight Centre for Data Analytics, Food for Health Ireland, Irish Centre for Research in Applied Geosciences (iCRAG), CeADAR Centre for Applied Data Analytics and Machine Intelligence, Bioeconomy Research Centre (BEACON) and I-Form Advanced Manufacturing Research Centre.

UCD has had nationally-leading success in many of the most prestigious European awards, including European Research Council and Marie Skłodowska-Curie schemes. Over the last decade UCD researchers have increased their annual number of papers in the international literature by 38% and have authored more than 33,000 papers in total. 60% of the papers were co-authored with researchers from more than 130 countries. These papers are cited by other researchers at a rate that is 75% above the world average.

Defining educational excellence: Teaching and Learning at UCD

UCD is globally recognised for its excellence in teaching and learning – 4 subjects are ranked in the top 50 in the world in the latest edition of the most-consulted university rankings (QS World University Ranking by Subject 2023). This quality of teaching is complemented by a high standard of support.

UCD is Ireland's leader in graduate education with over 12,000 graduate students; almost 20% of whom are graduate research students. 2,000 PhD students benefit from a structured PhD programme as well as the research-led education culture at UCD.

Our Schools at a Glance...

The College of Social Sciences and Law encompasses eleven Schools, more details on each School, their programmes and research activities are as follows.



UCD School of Archaeology

UCD School of Archaeology is Ireland's largest and leading centre for archaeological education and research. The School's research and teaching programmes explore not only the archaeology and environments of Britain and Ireland, but also of northwest Europe, the Mediterranean, North America, and East and Southeast Asia. The School is a friendly, supportive and approachable, with a thriving undergraduate and graduate research community. Archaeology combines the intellectual, analytical and interpretative skills of the humanities (e.g. History, Geography, Art), with the qualitative methods and techniques of Sociology and other social sciences – we work with people. Archaeologists in UCD also utilize advances in Information and Computer Technology (ICT), sciences (e.g. Biology, Chemistry, Physics) and the study of the human body (e.g. Osteology, Forensics, Anthropology).

Our archaeological scientists have world-leading expertise in the study of ancient soils, plants, insects, wood and organics, stone, metals and ceramics, as well as biomolecular analyses of past lifeways. The School offers a general MA in Archaeology, with a wide range of skills and topics taught, and our MSc in World Heritage Management and Conservation aims to give students the knowledge and skills to develop careers as managers responsible for World Heritage properties and equivalent cultural and natural sites around the world. The MSc and Graduate Diploma in Hunter-Gatherer Archaeology is for students interested in the fascinating and remarkable world of hunter-gatherers. The MSc in Experimental Archaeology and Material Culture, based at our UCD Centre for Experimental Archaeology and Material Culture involves innovative scientific and experiential reconstructions of past houses and material culture, so as to explore how people in the past made and lived with things.

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UCD School of Economics

UCD School of Economics is the leading centre for the study of economics in Ireland. The School's economists are experts with international reputations in a wide range of topics and publish in leading international journals and contribute regularly to economic policy debates. The School recognises that quality teaching at graduate level requires input from staff who are actively engaged in research of the highest calibre. The School's Masters programmes feature small group teaching from leading economists and a supervised research thesis or internship. Masters students are an integral part of the School's community, attending research seminars and receiving a wide range of supports to help them prepare for the research thesis element of their degree.

The School offers an MSc Applied Economics with core economics modules in the Autumn Trimester such as microeconomics, macroeconomics, quantitative economics, and econometrics, and in the second semester a range of options in the areas of labour economics, trade, public finances, etc. The MSc Quantitative Economics contains a similar first semester, but specializes in the Spring Trimester on advanced econometrics, time-series analysis, and potential modules from statistics, which provide a strong mathematical foundation for careers in policy analysis, finance, or other analytical careers. The MSc Behavioural Economics prepares students for future careers as research economists on a PhD track in behavioural economics. The MSc Economics and Data Analytics is a programme designed for those who want to gain some of the most in-demand skills for today's labour market.

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UCD School of Education

UCD School of Education is a leader in its field with over one hundred years of service to the wider education community in Ireland. The School's record of excellence in teaching and learning is built on a foundation of research excellence, recognized in the QS world subject rankings where we consistently achieve the highest of ratings for research activity. The School's team of dedicated academic staff prides itself on building synergies between the School's research and teaching, giving rise to innovative programmes that respond to changing needs in the education system. Amongst the School's innovative programmes are Doctor in Educational Psychology and blended learning opportunities in Professional Diploma Education Leadership alongside the School's more established diploma offerings and a range of master level studies. The School is the only provider of doctoral level studies in educational psychology nationally, which coincides with the School's doctoral provision in education, and in Children and Youth Studies.

We cater for educational professionals across all sectors of the education system – from early years through to higher education and welcome queries from international students. While the two-year Professional Masters Education is the main professional teaching degree, for international students, the MA Education is of interest, which is a one-year programme of general graduate training in education and pedagogy. The School also takes the lead in the interdisciplinary programme MSc Education, Children and Youth, which takes a very global perspective on children and youth, the UN Convention on the Rights of the Child and how it is changing policy and practice in working with children and young people across a range of services and settings; global developments that are shaping policies in relation to children and youth; risk and resilience in the lives of children and youth and their experience of health.

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UCD School of Geography

UCD School of Geography has a vibrant graduate community and is internationally recognised as a centre of excellence in geography-specific and interdisciplinary research. Academic staff occupy major leadership positions in national and international organisations and deliver internationally recognized, and academically rigorous, undergraduate and postgraduate degrees in key areas of the discipline. The School values collaboration in teaching and research and engagement with a diversity of stakeholders both within and outside the academy.

Aside from the general MA Geography programme, the MA Geopolitics and the Global Economy equips students with an in-depth understanding of international relations, war, and conflict resolution as well as national, local and regional economic development, global economic processes, global political events and the knowledge economy. The key objective of the MSc Risk, Resilience & Sustainability is to explore how sustainability and resilience work together in the safeguarding of ecosystem services, the economy, construction, transportation and political systems. It develops the School's vision of creating cutting edge research-led teaching that works towards 'shaping the future' in ways that are not only more environmentally sustainable, but also through addressing issues of critical importance to 'future proofing earth'. Finally, the MSc Applied Geospatial Analysis provides essential tools for geographers to explore, analyse and disseminate socio-economic and environmental data and considerations. The MSc Critical Geographies: Power and Inequalities allows us to engage with power relations and inequalities that create contemporary societies, spaces, places, environments and lives. 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UCD School of Information and Communication Studies (iSchool)

Our disciplines focus on the interaction of people, information & society. How people learn, work and play with information and technology. ICS is a member of the iSchool consortium and the only iSchool in Ireland.

Our school offers a range of taught postgraduate programmes preparing students for a wide variety of careers and further research options. At graduate level we have the internationally recognised Masters in Library and Information Studies, which is accredited by the Irish and American Library Associations. It has prepared generations of graduates for careers as information and library professionals. Our MSc Communication and Media programme is the first in Ireland to offer a broad degree in communication and media studies from an Information school perspective, where students can choose tracks to focus on Ethics & Policy, Design & Culture and Data Journalism. MSc Information Systems focuses on the design and deployment of human-centred computing and information systems, information management, combining theory and practice-based perspectives from across a range of disciplines. Students will learn a set of digital skills that will enable them to adapt to new professions that have yet to emerge. With support from Microsoft Ireland, UCD's School of Information and Communication studies has established the Microsoft-UCD MSc Digital Policy Programme, with the goal of building digital policy training and capability in Ireland and Europe. The MSc in Human Computer Interaction combines core elements and skills to prepare students to work within user experience and human computer interaction. The programme is unique in Ireland, harnessing the world-class expertise in the School of Information & Communication Studies to explore the discipline of human-computer interaction (HCI), from a social science perspective.

The School also offer diplomas, certificates and continuing professional development (CPD) courses.

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UCD Sutherland School of Law

Ranked one of the top 100 universities in the world for law, UCD Sutherland School of Law is the leading centre for legal education and research in Ireland. Since its establishment in 1911, the School's educational mission has remained at the heart of its endeavours and today the School's wide range of high quality programmes encourage the development of both a critical understanding of law, and the enhancement of legal and interdisciplinary knowledge and skills. The School works closely with law firms, government departments and NGOs to boost employability and develop professional skills among the School's students as part of the School's careers development programme. The School's students also benefit from the state-of-the-art Sutherland School of Law building, which opened in 2013, and enjoy extensive opportunities to study abroad at some of the leading law schools in Europe, North America and Asia, all contributing to the development of truly global lawyers.


At graduate level, for students with an undergraduate degree in law, the school provides LLM degrees such as a general LLM, the LLM International Commercial Law, the LLM Criminology and Criminal Justice, the LLM Intellectual Property and Information Technology, the LLM International Human Rights and the LLM European Law and Public Affairs. The Masters in Common Law (MCL) is a Masters conversion course for those wishing to progress to a career in law. This is accredited by the King's Inn. For non-law graduates, it furthermore offers the MSc Criminology and Criminal Justice and the MSc International Law and Business. Many of these programmes are of an interdisciplinary nature, with contributions from business, politics and international relations, sociology and other social science disciplines.

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UCD School of Philosophy

The School is the largest teaching and research centre for philosophy in Ireland. The School of Philosophy was recognized as one of the top schools in the English-speaking world for graduate studies in twentieth century continental philosophy by the 'Philosophical Gourmet' and ranked among the top one hundred Departments of Philosophy worldwide according to the QS World Rankings survey in 2023.

The School is unique in the broad range of research and teaching interests we offer. The School's areas of expertise include Contemporary European (Continental) Philosophy, Analytic Philosophy, History of Philosophy, Philosophy of Law, Political Philosophy and Cognitive Science. The School's staff have published widely in the history of philosophy, political philosophy, philosophy of mind, philosophy of language, and are prominent in international academic circles. The School is particularly noted for offering a friendly and open atmosphere where students and staff regularly interact and exchange ideas in discussion groups and coffee mornings. Many of the School's former students hold academic positions in Ireland, UK and USA. Others are prominent playwrights, journalists, human rights activists, broadcasters, film-makers and musicians.

Aside from the MA Philosophy degree, there are specialised degrees within the School in MA Contemporary European Philosophy. The School furthermore provides the interdisciplinary programmes in MA Philosophy and Public Affairs and MSc Cognitive Science. The latter concerns the interdisciplinary study of minds, brains and behaviours, and is a collaboration with psychology and computer science. This is a popular programme among international students. The School also offers the MA in Ethics, Theory and Practice which deals with ethical issues in government, healthcare and business.

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UCD School of Politics and International Relations

UCD School of Politics and International Relations (SPIRe) is the oldest and the largest School of its kind in the Republic of Ireland. SPIRe is an international School offering diverse programmes of study at graduate and undergraduate level.

SPIRe is a dynamic, multi-faceted and highly-international School. The QS University Rankings by Subject 2023 placed SPIRe in the top one hundred politics schools in the world and number one in Ireland by subject. The School's academic staff are engaged in cutting-edge research on a wide variety of political issues, including ethno-political conflict, human rights, and Ireland's role in the European Union, to name just a few. The School is also home to four research centres: the UN-linked Centre for Sustainable Development Solutions, the Centre for Peace and Conflict Research, the Centre for Asia-Pacific Research and the Connected Politics Lab.

The School provides a very wide range of graduate taught programmes. These include the MA/MSc Politics, MA/MSc European Politics and Policy Making, MEconSc European Public Affairs and Law and the MA Political Theory.

The study of MA/MSc International Relations probes into the causes and consequences of phenomena such as war, trade, regional integration, migration and terrorism. The MA/MSc International Political Economy explores the international trade, monetary and finance systems, the processes of globalisation, the impact of emerging economies, and the causes and consequences of economic underdevelopment. The MA in Middle East Politics programme is dedicated to different aspects of the politics of this region, focusing on issues facing the Middle East and its challenges.

The aim of MA/MSc International Development is broadly understood as concerning the improvement of quality of life in a world characterised by unprecedented opulence but also by widespread deprivation, destitution and poverty. The MSc Human Rights focuses on human rights research, policy or advocacy. The School also offers MSc Gender, Politics & International Relations and MSc Politics & Data Science

For most of these programmes students can choose between an MA and a MSc variant, with the former providing a more flexible choice of optional modules and the possibility to do an internship during the summer instead of a thesis, while the latter is more research focused, including training in statistics and research methods.

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UCD School of Psychology

UCD School of Psychology is a leading Irish centre for research, teaching and professional training in psychology, ranking in the top 200 psychology Schools in the world. The history of psychology in UCD began in 1958 when the university established the first psychology laboratory and the first psychology course in Ireland. Later UCD developed the first accredited undergraduate degree in psychology, and pioneered professional training in clinical psychology in Ireland, as well as in other areas of professional psychological practice.

This School offers the undergraduate degree in psychology, along with a number of Master programmes. This includes the Masters in Psychological Sciences which is a one-year highly competitive programme that develops students' professional skills. The programme uses a range of approaches to teaching, learning and assessment including traditional faculty-led seminars, student presentations, experiential learning, classroom role-play and case studies. An integral part of the research training is staff supervision and, usually, membership of a collaborative research team. The programme is typically taken as a bridge between the undergraduate and PhD or professional doctoral training. The focus is on acquiring basic applied psychology skills to equip the students for doctoral studies in clinical, counselling, educational or organisational psychology. MSc Disability is a two-year part time programme to develop an understanding of disability and rehabilitation theory, research and practice, both at a national and international level. Students explore the emerging field of disability studies – the interdisciplinary and scholarly exploration of all aspects of disability. The Higher Diploma in Psychology is an intensive two-year graduate conversion course for graduates with an honours degree in a discipline other than psychology, for those who would like to take the first step towards a professional career in psychology. The MSc in Behavioural Neuroscience offers advanced education and training in topics concerning human behaviour and its relation to the brain. The programme provides an excellent preparation for students who wish to pursue doctoral research in psychology, neuroscience or neuropsychology and equips students for work in research, medical and health settings. Students will gain key skills in research methods, experimental design, programming & data analysis.

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UCD School of Social Policy, Social Work and Social Justice

UCD School of Social Policy, Social Work and Social Justice is an interdisciplinary research and teaching hub for policy, practice and equality. The School is a centre of excellence for research, teaching and professional training in social policy, social work, equality studies and gender studies. It offers diverse degree programmes at undergraduate and graduate level, community outreach Certificate programmes, continuing professional development modules, and research degrees in social work, social policy and social justice (Master by Research and PhD programmes).

The School's research is interdisciplinary, international and influences policy and society. Teams and colleagues work on a range of topics (eg housing, family, child welfare, health care, migration, equality and gender studies) and have received funding from prestigious sponsors (eg Irish Research Council, European Union).

We provide the professional, two-year Professional MA in Social Work programme that is the qualifying degree for practice in social work. In recent years, the work environment for social work practitioners is becoming globalised. In addition, social justice and equality issues are an increasingly prominent concern in social scientific research.

The MSc Equality Studies is a unique programme popular, in particular, among American students, with core modules relating to issues from equality to economics, sociology, gender studies, human rights, and with a strong focus on practice and activism. The MA Gender Studies is a programme, popular with a diverse group of international students, which provides students with an opportunity to develop their critical understanding of contemporary society and bring their knowledge and understanding of policy making and social change to a new depth. The Master of Public Policy attracts professionals and practitioners in public, private, and nonprofit sectors, as well as recent graduates. The programme develops your skills in policy analysis, policy research, and policy implementation and evaluation. The MSocSc in Social Work, Welfare and Justice is designed for practising social workers interested in refining their analytical and management skills through post qualifying studies, and anyone who wishes to pursue research careers in policy making and analysis in the fields of social policy and social justice.

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UCD School of Sociology

The faculty members of UCD School of Sociology have a wide-ranging set of research interests, including comparative, quantitative and historical research, as well as work that focuses on the social complexity of, and emergent changes in, our modern world. The School's current research activities address issues of globalization, inequality, migration and diversity, social and policy networks, the state and national identity, health and illness, criminology and socio-legal studies, gender and childhood, and other topics.

At graduate level, aside from the MSc/MA Sociology, the MSc in Social Data Science is designed to enable students to combine their social sciences and/or cognate training with strong technical and analytical skills and to exploit the wide range of digitised and digital data now accessible by the public and private sectors.

Jointly with Trinity College Dublin, the School provides the MSc Comparative Social Change, with the specific objective of developing students' knowledge of the main currents of social change today, the social, cultural and economic forces which are driving them and the different forms they take across states.

MSc Global Solutions introduces students to a unique analytical framework that combines academic, activist, business and policy perspectives (the AABP model) to explore and study solutions to the most pressing global social, economic, political and environmental problems.

The MA in Social and Political Thought is a new inter- and multidisciplinary Master's degree. It brings together expertise from a range of UCD's academic departments, namely Sociology, Philosophy, Geography, History, Music, and Politics and International Relations.

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Research Degrees

PhD programmes

The College provides PhD programmes in all of the above Schools, as well as a series of interdisciplinary PhD programmes in Quantitative Social Science, Complex Systems and Computational Social Science, Global Human Development, Public Policy, European Governance and Children and Youth Studies. All programmes contain a taught component, and a carefully designed supervision process with a primary supervisor, a panel of additional advisors, and a transfer assessment process in the second year.

The UCD structured PhD programme enables our students to achieve the best possible experience of graduate research and training. The programme is about making a substantial and original contribution to knowledge, normally leading to peer-reviewed publications.

The structured PhD includes several innovative measures designed to support our students in achieving their academic and professional objectives. Our students are expected to carry out their own research under one-to-one supervision of an academic supervisor, and to make a substantial, original contribution to knowledge in their area, normally leading to published work.

As part of the programme, we encourage the development of transferable skills which enhance the students' marketability and opens them up to a larger sector of the job market.

A PhD programme typically takes at least three years full-time and six years part-time to complete. The award of the PhD is based on the completion of a written thesis and its successful defence in a *viva voce* (oral examination).

The College of Social Sciences and Law has many other research programmes such as Masters by Research or Professional Doctorate in their Schools and some are collaborative and thematic by nature.

You will learn innovative archaeological and scientific approaches to understanding things - both buildings and objects - from the past, and you will investigate them through practical and scientific projects. You will learn about different materials and how they were worked - and you will work them yourself using your body, your hands, touch, smell, sight, and hearing. The MSc and Graduate Diploma in Hunter-Gatherer Archaeology is for students interested in the fascinating and remarkable world of hunter-gatherers. It is often claimed that humans have spent 90- 99% of their existence as hunter-gatherers. Understanding these ways of life provides vital perspectives on human identity and the challenges and opportunities societies face today. Archaeology is the only discipline that can provide this information. Our programme will introduce students to key themes in the archaeology of past hunter gatherers, the relationship between past and present hunting and gathering communities, and the contemporary context of knowledge production about hunter-gatherers. Our primary focus is the archaeology of Homo sapiens huntergatherers. Our primary focus is the archaeology of Homo sapiens huntergatherers: we will include some discussion of non-Homo sapiens, but this is not a course on human evolution.

You will develop skills in project design and independent research, data analysis and interpretation, communicating the past to different stakeholders, as well as how to different perspectives on the past. You will be part of a dynamic, friendly and international postgraduate community in a School with a 160-year history of exceptional archaeological research and you will form part of the UCD Hunter Gatherer Research Group.

Course Highlights

The MSc Hunter-Gatherer Archaeology programme feeds into active field-work, lab and practical research projects carried out by members of the UCD Hunter-Gatherer Research Group. The MSc in Education, Children and Youth Studies is an interdisciplinary programme specialising in research, policy and practice relating to children and young people. Underpinned by the United Nations Convention on the Rights of Child, the programme focuses on children and young people's education, well-being and development, in the context of the complex and interdependent social issues facing contemporary childhoods and youth.

At its core is a commitment to foster critical and engaged enquiry into the everyday lives of children and young people across a range of contexts, so that their lives and well-being may be better understood. It draws on the best of international research, policy and practice across a range of disciplines and will deepen and challenge your understanding of the complexities of children and young people's lives, of the challenges they face as well as the resilience they display across a range of life circumstances. Above all it emphasizes the rights and competency of children and young people, exploring what that means for both policy and practice.

Course Highlights

The MA (Ed) Mentoring, Leading and Global Learning makes an important new contribution to the professional development of educators. With a focus on the skills of mentoring and coaching, the degree offers students the chance to widen their professional competencies. It is a part-time online degree, taken over three years.

All of the modules are offered remotely (online). The module content is delivered asynchronously. Students are also supported with some online synchronous sessions and individual online meetings. In this way, students form a community of learners, while also retaining autonomy around how they manage their time to complete their modules and submit assignments. The programme therefore suits learners who are in full-time employment, or who have regular commitments. Students can manage their learning to maximise the use of their time.

The MA Geopolitics and the Global Economy is the most popular Graduate degree programme offered by the School of Geography (admitting 10-15 students each year) and has been in existence for over a decade. 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MSc Risk, Resilience and Sustainability

One Year Full Time | Two Years Part Time

Risk, Resilience and Sustainability are three keywords of our time. A deeper understanding of risk, the ways in which it is generated, experienced and managed is fundamental to addressing many of our pressing societal issues. Concepts such as 'critical infrastructure' underpin government initiatives to prepare, and manage for, global challenges such as climate change, natural disasters, ecological uncertainty, and extreme social inequity. The concept of sustainability is heavily enshrined in the UN Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs), which have been widely taken up as a road map for future development around the world.

The key objective of the course is to explore how sustainability and resilience work together in the safeguarding of ecosystem services. The degree provides key training in critical skills such as GIS, Remote Sensing and with the option to specialise in coastal risk through (i) INFOMAR Seabed Mapping Marine training and (ii) INFOMAR Marine and Survey data (ship time) modules. Other module choices allow for specialization in aspects of sustainability relating to cities and the Global South. This course is also offered as a Graduate Diploma.

Course Highlights

Geography as a discipline offers expertise in the environment and the societal dimensions of risk, resilience and sustainability and is well placed to offer an interdisciplinary framework. How do we study communication – interpersonal and mediated – and what theories do we use? What is the relationship between communication, media and power? How do we create engaging content, interfaces and experiences for effective communication? What can we learn from the history of communication & media? What does the future hold for their role in society? What skills and experience do you need to meet these challenges in an ever growing and evolving sector?

This programme introduces students to basic concepts and issues in both classic and current theories of communication giving a historical and critical understanding of how to understand communication and media by learning to situate them within perspectives such as critical data studies, information analytics, platform capitalism, cultural computing, interface critique, software studies and so on. Our Digital Policy programmes are interdisciplinary. Flowing from content developed at our UCD Centre for Digital Policy, they are designed to offer graduates the opportunity to study some of the core topical, theoretical, and methodological issues that arise today. These include investigating the institutional and public policy dimensions of the prevalence of digital technologies, digital infrastructures, and data processing in all dimensions of life. Our programmes will allow students to study the underlying social conditions (economic, political, and cultural) that give rise to and influence such technologies and their governance, as well as the multiple public sector and commercial contexts where policy is made information systems and enacted.

Our innovative programme mixes theoretical and applied approaches. We introduce students to basic concepts and issues in digital policy, giving historical, contextual, regulatory, and critical understandings of how to theorise digital technologies and environments. This MSc combines core elements and skills to prepare you to work within user experience and human computer interaction.

The Masters will use a combination of lectures, seminars and tutorials including self-directed and autonomous learning activities to introduce students to principles, theory, practice and critique, combining approaches from computer science and social sciences. A core part of the programme will involve you using these knowledge and skills to conduct a cutting edge research project in the area of HCI.

The MSc/Grad Dip in Information Systems incorporate aspects of information technology and data analytics with a firm grounding in social science. The programmes are interdisciplinary in nature and explores how information is gathered, analysed and communicated. Emerging technologies such as artificial intelligence are also examined within the context of questions concerning the impact of technology on society.

Through the study of informatics, students will understand the process of information creation, storage and access. 



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




MSc Cognitive Science

One Year Full Time | Two Years Part Time

Course codes: W358 | W359



Cognitive Science is an interdisciplinary field that has evolved during the past few decades at the intersection of a number of existing disciplines, including linguistics, computer science, philosophy, psychology and neuroscience. Each discipline makes its own distinctive contribution to the goal of teasing out the relationships between minds, brains and behaviour.

The MSc in Cognitive Science is ideal for students interested in issues relating to the understanding of the human mind from philosophical, psychological, and computational perspectives. Advanced computational skills are not a prerequisite.

The course is designed as an ideal preparation for students hoping to tackle advanced research topics at PhD level. Students will have the opportunity to be familiar with the problems associated with minds, brains, and behaviour and the theoretical approaches to them, know the principal 20th Century philosophical approaches to mind/brain issues, understand the principal issues, models, and concepts used in cognitive psychology, and develop an interdisciplinary perspective that links and integrates insights from multiple specialised domains.

Course Highlights

The cognitive science programme is unique in Ireland and one of very few such taught programmes worldwide.

A strength of these courses is the wide range of disciplines from the UCD Schools of Computer Science, Philosophy, Psychology and Linguistics that contribute to the programme.

This is not a vocational course. In the course of one year we cover a very broad range of material, thus greatly increasing the breadth of academic exposure of our students. Historically, about half of the students go on to do PhD studies, and many others look for work in research. This course will not make a psychologist out of a non-psychologist, or an IT specialist out of someone who is not an IT specialist upon entry. It will enable students to tackle research issues they might not have been able for before, and to do PhDs in areas that would not have been possible before. It also has the potential to enrich one's engagement with a very broad range of challenging material. Many students pursue this course because of a passionate interest in our scientific understanding of what it is to be human. Please note that a cognitive science degree is not part of an accredited programme towards a clinical degree.

The ever-popular MA in Contemporary European Philosophy Programme draws on the three main specialisations of the relevant faculty. These are German Idealism and Post-Kantian Philosophy, Phenomenology and Critical Theory. Topics treated in the modules include transcendental and absolute idealism and subjectivity, intentionality and being in the world, embodiment and otherness, critique of ideology, autonomy and recognition and feminism and gender theory.

On successful completion of the programme graduates will:

- Have an understanding of the central ideas and key texts in contemporary European Philosophy including twentieth century phenomenology and/or critical theory;
- Have developed their own arguments and ideas with respect to these questions and approaches;
- Have the capacity to read and interpret difficult philosophical texts;
- Have the capacity to communicate clear lines of argument precisely and succinctly.

In association with the UCD Centre for Ethics in Public Life (CEPL), UCD School of Philosophy is offering an MA that provides philosophical training in Ethics, as well as enabling students to experience a context for professional Ethics through inter-disciplinary elements of the programme. Ethics is understood broadly as the study of how to act well, and includes elements of moral philosophy and political/social theory.

As graduates of this module you will be well-placed to understand and help deal with ethical issues in areas such as government, healthcare, business, agriculture, planning, education, law and journalism. But you will also have had the opportunity to develop a theoretical understanding of the nature of Ethics and its place in human life more generally. Having an understanding of Ethics, both at the level of theory and in its practical contexts is of obvious benefit in a very wide variety of career paths.

The Masters of Arts in Philosophy and Public Affairs is a one-year interdisciplinary programme (or two years part-time), designed to offer graduates of either philosophy or the social sciences (politics, economics, history) the opportunity to study some of the many areas of overlap between the disciplines, and especially to explore foundational questions in public policy formulation. The innovative programme mixes the abstract and the applied, with half the modules from the School of Philosophy, and half from existing MA modules offered by the School of Politics and International Relations, the School of Social Policy, Social Work and Social Justice.

Our MA in Philosophy and Public Affairs programme is aimed at students who wish to deepen their knowledge of the core areas of philosophy and its application to public affairs at graduate level. It is also intended to provide a good foundation of graduate work for students who wish to continue to more advanced graduate research. It aims to provide an integration of social and political theory with the philosophical implications of the area.

Political Theory—contemplating how we should live together—is as old as politics itself. Issues such as justice, freedom, inequality, democratic participation, human rights, immigration and multiculturalism, security and terror call for consideration of the moral dimension of politics, informed by both contemporary political thinkers and the history of political thought.

Analysing, criticising, and ordering moral values and principles is important for governments, the media, civil society groups and individual citizens. Political theory combines a rigorous training in argument analysis and value theory with room for an imaginative search for and discussion of solutions. Some of the biggest challenges in political life is how to prioritise our moral commitments: How do we square free speech with protections from hate speech?, Given the urgent need for climate action, is it permissible or even required to close down entire industries with the resulting loss of jobs and livelihoods?, How should we balance the commitment to democratic participation with the need for expert advice on many important policy issues? etc. Part of doing political theory is to analyse the different normatively significant concerns and discuss how to argue for and against different orderings.

Course Highlights

The MA in Political Theory allows you to explore the moral dimension of political choices, institutions, and ideologies. It has a flexible design that allows you to set your own priority with regard to deepening your understanding of normative theory and/or exploring different moral issues and concerns.

The School of Politics and International Relations offers an MA/MSc Politics degree, which was developed for those who wish to understand the role of politics in shaping the great issues of our day including power and conflict, distribution and inequality, relations between nations, and the new challenges of globalisation, financial crisis, national security, and climate change. The course focuses on the two traditional pillars of the discipline – political theory and comparative politics. **Comparative politics** looks at the European nation-states in a comparative perspective. It analyses regime types, political stability, change and crisis, electoral and party systems. The courses build on expertise within the School on international development, political economy and public policy, ethnic conflict and nationalism, and European Union politics. Furthermore, the study of Irish politics in comparative context has deep roots at UCD. **Political theory**—the reflection on the nature and morality of politics—is almost as old as politics itself. As part of a human being's appreciation of their condition, it has always been understood as valuable in its own right. Government, media and other groups with immediate practical concerns increasingly look to theory to find new ways forward in situations of conflict, inequality and global change.

The explosion of online and social media, the proliferation of digitized information, and improved electronic access to political decision-making processes provide new opportunities to study existing and emerging political processes in various democratic and non-democratic political regimes. The simultaneous development of cutting-edge data science methods to study digital text, audio, and video provide the tools we need to take advantage of these opportunities. The MSc Politics and Data Science is designed to equip students with the theoretical knowledge and methodological skills necessary to examine and understand politics in the digital age.

The MSc Politics and Data Science programme is organised around two streams of study. The first stream grounds students with backgrounds in political science and related social sciences in data science methods. The second stream is geared towards students with computer science or related technical backgrounds, teaching them about social science research design and theories in political science.

The programme shall equip students with both the theoretical overview and the empirical tools necessary to understand and engage with the brave new world of digitised politics, and the expansion in scale, types, and complexity of data available to study political phenomenon. The MSc in Behavioral Neuroscience offers advanced education and training in topics concerning human behavior and its relation to the brain. The programme provides an excellent preparation for students who wish to pursue doctoral research in psychology, neuroscience or neuropsychology and equips students for work in research, medical and health settings. Students will gain key skills in research methods, experimental design, programming & data analysis. This is achieved through lab rotation and by pairing students with academic supervisors based on their research interests to complete a 30-credit research project.

Behavioural Neuroscience is an interdisciplinary field which combines expertise from a range of disciplines, including Psychology, Neuroscience, Engineering and Economics. Teaching on the MSc will be provided by UCD faculty with backgrounds in wide-ranging but complementary fields, cutting across boundaries to provide students with new insights into this exciting topic.

The School of Psychology has laboratories dedicated to the study of Attention & Memory, Perception, Neuropsychology and Media Psychology and has high-density mobile EEG, neuronavigated TMS, high-definition transcranial electric current stimulation (tES), and high-resolution eye-trackers. The MSc in Disability is a one-year full-time programme delivered by the UCD Centre for Disability Studies within the UCD School of Psychology. This programme is developed for all who have an interest in disability, including people with disabilities, family members and those working in the disability field. The programme exposes students to concepts of disability, evidence-based disability practice, national and international disability policy and current developments in disability legislation.

The M.Psych.Sc. is designed to equip psychology graduates with the inter-personal sensitivities, methodological and statistical skills that form the basis for a wide range of professional training programmes in psychology, including for example, clinical, education, organisational, and academic. Students are expected to be curious, self motivated and independent in their approach to the study of psychology and to develop the skills to become reflective in their professional work. The learning environment emphasizes the active participation of students, encourages team work and collaborative research. Students are encouraged to develop their critical appraisal, analytical and methodological capabilities through interaction with faculty and peers and through independent study. The focus of the programme is on professional skill acquisition and this is reflected in the active nature of the learning environment in the modules. The programme uses a range of approaches to teaching, learning and assessment including traditional faculty-led seminars, student presentations, experiential learning, classroom role-play, and case studies. An integral part of the research training is staff supervision and, usually, membership of a collaborative research team.

The course includes a psychometric assessment module that meets requirements to obtain BPS certification. Many of the supervised research projects result in a publication.

Assessment strategies include both traditional and innovative approaches, as appropriate to the specific skill set that is being assessed.

The Higher Diploma in Psychology is an intensive two-year postgraduate conversion course for graduates with an honours degree in a discipline other than psychology, who would like to take the first step towards a professional career in psychology. The curriculum for the Higher Diploma in Psychology is taught in conjunction with the Honours BA in Psychology. Core modules cover the key areas of psychology required for PSI accreditation.

The MA in Gender Studies is a rigorous, interdisciplinary and dynamic programme of learning in feminisms, sexualities, masculinities, gender debates, politics and activism. A global, decolonial and intersectional perspective informs the programme, offering a complex understanding of how oppression and discrimination operate across society, politics and the economy. Students will explore and challenge gender inequalities and (hetero)sexisms and their relational connection with wider forms of oppression and discrimination. Students will garner deep knowledge of vibrant transnational fields of study in gender, feminisms, sexualities and masculinities; will cultivate critical thinking and analysis skills applied to gender in the social world; and will develop skills in research and writing and how to ask critical gender questions through our use of innovative approaches in the classroom.



The MSc Comparative Social Change is a one year full time programme which is jointly delivered by the UCD School of Sociology and the Department of Sociology at Trinity College Dublin. 

The MA in Social and Political Thought is a new inter- and multidisciplinary Master's degree. It brings together expertise from a range of UCD's academic departments, namely Sociology, Philosophy, Geography, History, Music, and Politics and International Relations. Thinking about social and political issues and problems doesn't stop at disciplinary boundaries. The MA in Social and Political Thought harvests the benefits that come with a more openly structured, interdisciplinary approach that is based on a wider contextual appreciation of political and social ideas. It will provide students with a rich understanding of the theoretical and practical dimensions of key social ideas. Students will develop the knowledge base and critical skills required to think beyond disciplinary boundaries when addressing contemporary social and political problems.
