Module Purpose

Practice education placements are integral components embedded throughout the Physiotherapy academic programmes, facilitating the translation of theory into practice and the achievement of the standards of proficiency. Practice education placements on the UCD Physiotherapy programmes ensure that students are prepared to enter the Physiotherapy profession by meeting the physiotherapy registration board standards of proficiency for physiotherapists.

In the final year of both the UCD BSc and Professional Masters in Physiotherapy programmes, students can apply to undertake a practice education module with UCDVO. Here, students undertake the UCDVO programme consisting of global citizenship education courses, workshops and events carried out in a non-formal context, followed by 4 weeks of clinical placement overseas with clinical partners in Tanzania and Uganda. The focus of the clinical placement is strengthening community based rehabilitation and family centred care for children with disabilities, working with families and local staff involving skill sharing, education, outreach and advocacy activities.



Methods of assessment

Practice education placements are assessed using a nationally agreed physiotherapy assessment form called the Clinical Placement Assessment Form. Physiotherapy students undertaking UCDVO placements are supervised by a clinical tutor in Physiotherapy who travels with them and local physiotherapy and healthcare staff.

IMPACT of Community Engaged Learning on students

More than 160 Physiotherapy students have participated in UCDVO since 2012. In a qualitative study using semi structured interviews with past UCDVO Physiotherapy volunteers to understand the impact of the UCDVO Physiotherapy placement experience, UCD physiotherapy graduates reported that the experience enhanced development of their clinical and intercultural competencies and facilitated personal growth through overcoming challenges of the unique learning environment characterised by the culture and context. They attributed enhanced professional development to experiences and learnings from their UCDVO Physiotherapy placement experience.
